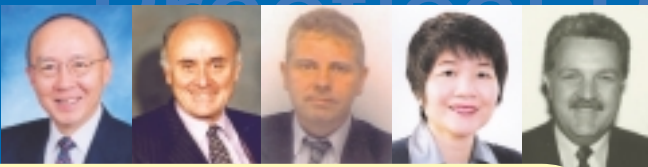

Plenary Session A

"Regulating Privacy: what others are doing"

Mr Raymond Tang

(Privacy Commissioner for Personal Data, Hong Kong)

Raymond Tang, Privacy Commissioner for Personal Data for Hong Kong since September 2001 monitors, supervises and promotes compliance with the Personal Data (Privacy) Ordinance. The Privacy Commissioner is an independent statutory body established under the Ordinance. The Ordinance applies to both public and private sectors. The office of the Commissioner is empowered to investigate suspected breaches of the Ordinance and enforce compliance.

Mr Tang has for many years (since 1967) practised as a lawyer in England and Hong Kong, initially as a solicitor and later a barrister at the Hong Kong Bar. He acquired experience in regulatory work when in 1996 he was appointed Chief Counsel to the Securities and Futures Commission of Hong Kong heading its Legal Division.

Prof. Allan Fels AO

(Chairman, Australian Competition and Consumer Commission, Australia)

On July 1, 2003 Professor Allan Fels will become Dean of the Australia and New Zealand School of Government and retire as ACCC Chairman.

He has been Chairman of the Australian Competition and Consumer Commission since 1995. Professor Fels was Chairman of the former Trade Practices Commission from 1991 until 1995. He was also Chairman of the Prices Surveillance Authority from 1989 until 1992. Professor Fels was the Director of the Graduate School of Management, Monash University from 1985 until 1990 and is now an Honorary Professor in the Faculty of Business and Economics at Monash University.

Professor Fels is the Co-Chairman of the Joint Group on Trade and Competition at the OECD.

He was awarded the Order of Australia in June 2001.

Plenary Session B

"Building Community Trust: a practical perspective"

Mr Phil Walker

(Head of Information Governance, National Health Service, United Kingdom)

Currently Head of Information Governance within both the Department of Health for England and the NHS Information Authority. The latter is a Special Health Authority responsible for implementing the NHS IM&T strategy. Within the Department of Health, Phil has responsibility for policy on confidentiality, data protection, IM&T security, information quality and a range of related areas that collectively fall within the scope of what is now termed Information Governance. Having worked previously in both private and public sectors, Phil joined the Department of Health in 1991 and has been responsible for NHS confidentiality and data protection issues since 1996.

Phil is married with three children and has little time for other interests or hobbies!

Parallel Session 1

"Privacy Laws: practical effect on global businesses and consumers"

Mrs Pamela W.S. Chan

(Chief Executive of the Hong Kong Consumer Council, Hong Kong)

Mrs Chan is Chief Executive of the Hong Kong Consumer Council (HKCC). She was President of Consumers International (CI) from 1997 - 2000 and is currently Member of the Council and Executive Board. CI has more than

270 member consumer organisations in 121 countries.

Hong Kong Consumer Council carries out a comprehensive range of consumer empowerment activities including consumer and competition advocacy, complaints handling, comparative testing, research, market surveillance, and consumer education. The Council has been a strong advocate for protection of consumer privacy, the most recent example being protection on sharing of credit data by financial institutions.

Mrs Chan tenders advice to consumer associations, provincial governments and Law Reform Commissions in Mainland China (there are 4,000 consumer associations in the country). She was consulted by some governments, such as Laos and Bangladesh, on the drafting of Consumer Laws and consumer policy issues.

Parallel Session 2

"People: organisational structures and incentives to support privacy"

Mr W. Peter Cullen

(Corporate Privacy Officer, Royal Bank of Canada (RBC) Financial Group, Canada)

As corporate privacy officer, Peter Cullen manages the RBC Financial Group's privacy program. He has responsibility for overall co-ordination, strategic initiatives, development and application of customer privacy concepts, and implementation of information practices and policies.

Born in Cambridge, England on July 24, 1958, Cullen joined the bank in Montreal in November 1976, transferring to Vancouver in May 1978. He has an extensive retail banking background, at both the field and head office levels, including customer service and operations, human resources and branch operations and training. His most recent posting included responsibility for customer loyalty

where he championed initiatives to drive customer commitment.

Cullen has a Master of Business Administration from Richard Ivey School of Business (University of Western Ontario).

Ms Anna Fielder

(Director, Office for Developed and Transition Economies, Consumers International, United Kingdom)

As Director, Office for Developed and Transition Economies (ODTE) of Consumers International, Ms Fielder is responsible for the organisation's work principally in Europe, Middle East and North America. ODTE has initiated important international research policy projects in the area of electronic commerce and sustainable consumption, set up the secretariat and process of the Transatlantic Consumer Dialogue, and is carrying out large-scale development programs in Eastern Europe. Key reports published by ODTE over the past four years include: Consumers@Shopping; Should I Buy; Privacy@net; Disputes in Cyberspace; and Credibility on the Web. ODTE contributed to the OECD Guidelines for Consumer Protection in Electronic Commerce, (1999). Prior to 1996, Anna undertook many consumer investigations and campaigns in her employment with for Consumers Association, UK. She is a graduate of London University, with a BA and a Masters in Classics.

"Technology: supporting a culture of privacy in your organisation"

Dr Brian Richards

(Chief Information Officer, Health Insurance Commission, Australia)

Dr Brian Richards, as Chief Information Officer, Health Insurance Commission (HIC), Brian is responsible for developing HIC's information strategies, including ensuring the privacy and security of

personal information held by HIC, and has played a key role in the introduction of Public Key Infrastructure to safeguard information transmitted via the Internet. The HIC administers a range of national health programs in Australia including Medicare (universal health insurance scheme), the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme (subsidising a wide range of medicines), and the Australian Organ Donor Register.

Current and previous experience: Member, National Electronic Health Records Taskforce, which published a major report on a national system of electronic health records (*HealthConnect*); Medical Practitioner; Senior Executive and Leadership roles in health policy, health service administration, health financing, professional training and regulation, and in the introduction of ICT into health care.

Mr Charles Britton

(Senior Policy Officer, IT and Communications, Australian Consumers' Association, Australia)

Charles Britton works with the Australian Consumers' Association (ACA) as Senior Policy Officer, IT and Communications. As Policy Officer Charles prepares ACA policy positions, then campaigns and advocates to Government, industry and in the media to achieve better outcomes for consumers. Charles has a career background in ICT with various organisations, ranging from large listed companies to small community organisations.

Charles has a Masters Degree in Sociology from Canterbury University (NZ) and a Master of Commerce from UNSW.

Ms Jennifer Stoddart

(President of the Commission d'accès à l'information du Québec, Canada)

Ms Stoddart, President of the Commission d'accès à l'information du Québec was admitted to the Quebec Bar in 1981. Prior to this she was the Vice President, Commission des droits de la personne et des droits de la jeunesse du Québec, following a number of public administration roles with the Governments of Québec and Canada.

Ms Stoddart obtained an M.A. in History from the Université du Québec à Montréal, pursued doctoral studies at the Université de Paris VII, and taught history and legal sciences at the Université du Québec à Montréal and McGill University. She has published widely on the administration of justice and human rights.

Ms Stoddart is a member of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Institute for the Administration of Justice (2002 to 2004).

"Law enforcement with respect"

Mr Jonathan Symmonds

(General Manager, Federal Government Solutions, Teradata Division, Australia)

Jonathan is the General Manager for Teradata Solutions based in Canberra. Teradata was established as a separate division of NCR in August 2000.

The role of Teradata in Australia is growing rapidly. Existing Data Matching, Compliance and Profiling initiatives are being complemented by Teradata's powerful analytical capabilities. The unique architecture of Teradata solutions allow these systems to scale to a point that supports a 'single Version of the Truth' to enable event based decisions to be made near real time. Parallel Session 6 "A Safe and Open Society: the role of privacy regulators"

Mr Joseph Meade

(Data Protection Commissioner, Ireland)

Mr Joseph (Joe) Meade was appointed for a five year term as Data Protection Commissioner in September 2000. Mr Meade a native of Co. Clare was born in 1950 and is married with three children.

Mr Mead has wide experience in the Irish and international public services. Key positions he has held include Secretary General, Office of the Comptroller and Auditor General (the State Auditor) from 1967, European Court of Auditors in Luxembourg (1993-94), member (1997-1999) and Chairperson (2000) Audit Commission of the European Space Agency in Paris, and member (1999), Referendum Commission in Ireland.

He graduated in 1974 with a business and finance degree from University College Dublin

Ms Christine Nixon, APM

(Chief Commissioner of Police for Victoria, Australia)

Ms Nixon commenced duty as Chief Commissioner of Victoria Police on 23rd April 2001, after service with the New South Wales Police Force from 1972, during which she attained the rank of Assistant Commissioner.

She has an extensive range of experience. She served as an Assistant Commissioner in charge

of various regions of New South Wales; the Human Resources Department, Development and Training Department, Specialist Skills and the Criminal Investigation Branch.

Among her many educational qualifications, Ms Nixon has a Master of Public Administration Degree from Harvard, U.S.A., as well as being a Research Fellow of Harvard. Ms Nixon has also had an attachment with the London Metropolitan Police Force for six months.

Ms Nixon commands an organisation of almost 11,600 staff with an annual budget of \$1 billion operating out of 327 police stations throughout the State.

Plenary Session D "Identity and Privacy: who wants to know and why?"

Ms Carol Coye Benson

(Partner, Glenbrook Partners, United States of America)

Ms Benson is a partner with Glenbrook Partners, a research and advisory firm that helps companies leverage the electronic delivery of financial services, with particular focus on payments, digital identity, and authentication. An expert in authentication systems, Ms Benson speaks frequently on topics including authentication, identity theft, and privacy.

Ms Benson's background is in product development, marketing and strategy for physical world and Internet-based financial services companies variously in the US and Internationally. She has held management responsibility for corporate cash management, EDI, new monetary system development, payment security and authentication, credit cards, database marketing, smart cards, and securities processing at Deutsche Bank, Banker's Trust, Visa International, and Citibank.

Parallel Session 8 "Is my privacy the same as your privacy?"

Ms Dawn Casey

(Director, National Museum of Australia, Australia)

Prior to her appointment as Director of the National Museum of Australia in 1999.

Ms Casey was Chief General Manager of the Acton Peninsula Project Task Force, the body responsible for the construction of the new National Museum.

Ms Casey has wide-ranging experience in the management of indigenous and cultural heritage policy issues. As a member of the Department of Prime Minister and Cabinet, she was responsible for the establishment of the Council for Aboriginal Reconciliation.

She has provided policy advice on issues associated with Australia's national cultural institutions and served as Chair of the Heritage Collections Committee, the body with responsibility for implementing specific programs to address issues of collection management, preservation and conservation, research and documentation, and access.

Ms Casey has received three Commonwealth Public Service Australia Day Medals.

Mr Ken Anderson

(Director of Legal Services, Information and Privacy Commissioner of Ontario, Canada)

Ken Anderson is the Director of Legal Services for the Information and Privacy Commissioner of Ontario based in Toronto. Ken is a frequent speaker on access & privacy issues, and he teaches privacy law for the University of Ottawa. Before joining the IPC, Ken was the Commissioner of Legal



Services for two large regional municipalities in Ontario. He began his legal career with a litigation law firm in Ottawa, and later focused on administrative and public law. Ken received degrees in both law and business administration from the University of Western Ontario.

Dr John Joseph Borking

(Director of Borking Consultancy, The Netherlands)

Drs John J. Borking (58) (Dutch Nationality) is Director of Borking Consultancy (Wassenaar) and Associate Board member of the Dutch Data Protection Authority (CBP) in The Hague (The Netherlands). He was till 1 January 2002 Vice-President of de Registratiekamer and Commissioner of CBP.

He participates in several EU funded research projects. He is also reviewer of EU research projects and member of the CEN -IPSE steering committee. Furthermore he is board member of the Dutch Association of Privacy Officers (NGFG) and is arbitrator / mediator and board member of the Dutch Foundation for Alternative Dispute Resolution for ICT (SGOA). He is also board member of the Netherlands Gaming Control Board and advising on interactive gambling.

Mr John Grimes

(Director, Strategic Development, Argus Solutions, Australia)

John Grimes is the co-founder of Argus Solutions Ltd, a Sydney based company specialising in iris recognition technology. John has been responsible for developing the change management and privacy programs for over 85 clients introducing iris recognition in Australia and the region. Argus Solutions was awarded the iPrivacy award by the peak IT industry body AIIA in recognition of the companies privacy sensitive approach. John is a graduate of Flinders University (BA, Political Science) and Australian National University (MA, Strategic Studies).

Keynote Address

The Hon. Daryl Williams AM QC MP

(Commonwealth Attorney-General, Australia)

Daryl Williams AM QC MP was appointed Commonwealth Attorney-General on 8 March 1996 and became a member of Cabinet on 5 October 1997. He has been the Federal Member for Tangney since 1993.

As Attorney-General, Mr Williams has responsibility for a wide range of matters, including federal courts and tribunals, national security, human rights, international law, censorship, family law, native title, bankruptcy, constitutional issues and privacy law.

Mr Williams holds law degrees from the University of Western Australia and Oxford University. He was selected as WA Rhodes Scholar in 1965 and was appointed a Queen's Counsel in 1982.

Plenary Session E "Taking privacy to the people"

Mr Richard Thomas

(Information Commissioner, United Kingdom)

Richard Thomas took up appointment as the Information Commissioner on 30 November 2002. He has independent status, reporting directly to Parliament, with responsibility for enforcing the Freedom of Information Act 2000 and Data Protection Act 1998.

His previous career has included: Director of Public Policy at Clifford Chance (the international law firm); Director of Consumer Affairs at the Office of Fair Trading; Head of Public Affairs and Legal Officer at the National Consumer Council; and Solicitor with the Citizens Advice Bureau Service.

He has also previously held various public appointments, including membership of the Lord Chancellor's Civil Justice Review Advisory Committee and the Board of the Financial Ombudsman Service.
